### Creation of the VRRI (Vecova)

1960 - Disability Rights Movement The disability sector undergoes a significant change – community living is seen as a right for all citizens, regardless of ability.

Disability maverick Christine Meikle approaches the University of Calgary to develop a program to train persons with research-based services and programs.



#### 1966 - Incorporation

The Vocational and Rehabilitation Research Institute (VRRI) is incorporated on July 19, 1966.



#### 1969 - Doors Open

146 individuals are assessed as potential trainees for the program in the first year. The VRRI opens its doors on July 15, 1969 and begins providing services and supports to persons with disabilities in the community.

### Wellness

- 105 persons with disabilities received work, education, leisure, volunteer and other opportunities through our Community Access services
- 180,000 patrons accessed our swimming, aquatic and dryland programs
- \$16,000+ in fee subsidies provided to children, youth and adults who accessed our recreation programs
- 114 children and adults with disabilities enrolled in our Empower Abilities and Music & Movement programs
- **276** persons with disabilities received group and individual counselling, assessments and behavioural consultations
- 5,000 people attended 12 Professional Supports Educational Series presentations

#### **Building connections**

Vecova partnered with Alberta Health Services (AHS) and the Parkinson Association of Alberta to create recreation programming to meet the needs of specific demographics and create a positive impact in the community.

- 101 staff provided Complex Medical and Coverage Living Support services to Vecova clients
- 76 staff provided Complex Needs (Behavioural) Living Support services to Vecova clients
- 40 staff provided Supportive Group and Roommate Living Support services to Vecova clients

### Highlights:

### **Providing safe housing**

Vecova made strides in providing safe housing to individuals with complex risk behaviour by implementing a harm-reduction model and working with mental health clinicians to explore treatment options, support individuals through legal proceedings and provide a safe home for individuals with addiction issues.



### Finding a place to call home



A couple years ago, Alison and Mitchell almost met. They were both approached separately for an opportunity to be each other's roommates. Alison wanted to continue her work as a Supportive Roommate, and Mitchell was looking to gain his independence from living at home. That fell through, but little did they know it would only take a few years before the opportunity to live together would come true again through Vecova.

Alison had been with Vecova since 2009. She loves working with the community, and in particular, being a Supportive Roommate. In the past two years, she had met with about nine different families to find a good fit for both her and the client to live together in a long-term situation.

Then she met Mitchell.

Mitchell and his family had made the decision for him to move out on his own and gain some independence. He was working at Home Depot and generating an income for himself. With support from Vecova, they decided to pursue finding a Supportive Roommate for him. Soon after meeting, Alison started searching for a place to live in the south east of Calgary that was affordable, safe and accessible. They both wanted to find a place that would work for both of their needs.

"We looked at different places together. It was a fun way to get to know each other!" They have now lived together for a few months and are enjoying it. For Mitchell, it took some adjustment but now he loves it.

"It's my first time on my own. It was scary for the first couple days, but I got used to it," Mitchell revealed. "I left 'the parent umbrella,' but it's fine. There are no problems; I'm used to it – it's like any other day."

"He doesn't need a mom or a caregiver," Alison said. "I see myself as his big sister, there to support him, when he needs it, so he can be as independent as possible. This is his goal."

Mitchell's mom said that "it was an adjustment for us, but we felt very comfortable with Alison as soon as we met her. He is very happy and independent and this is what we wanted for him."

Ultimately, they are a great roommate match for each other.

### Social Enterprise

### Highlights

Innovative technology

Vecova's Bottle Depot installed an assistive technology that allows our employees to better serve customers quickly while allowing the staff who sort the recycled material by product type and size to be more efficient and accurate.

#### Raising community awareness

Vecova's Bottle Pick-Up Service hosted a "Beat The Thieves" event with InjaNation in September 2018 to raise awareness of Vecova and to take action against thefts to Vecova's Bottle Depot donation bins.

This new technology aids employees in maintaining the accuracy and focus on customer service that Vecova's Bottle Depot is known for.

In 2018, Vecova's Bottle Depot received the Trevor Nickel Service Excellence Award for Customer Service in recognition of its admirable performance.

Vecova continues to lead the way as one of Calgary's premiere bottle depots with this new technology, which will increase accuracy, effectiveness and customer service.

## **Employment**Services

- 13 students in Rocky View School District participated in our Youth Transition and Work Experience Program
- 74 clients accessed our Employment Services to find meaningful employment in the community
- 48 business partners worked with our Employment Services to employ persons with disabilities

### Highlights

#### **Vecova client receives Star Award**

A Vecova client received a Star Award from the Ramada Inn where she has worked for three years. She was given this award by the Housekeeping Manager for her positive work ethic and personality, which brightens her co-workers' work day.

### Youth Transition and Work Experience

The Youth Transition and Work Experience program is a one-year pilot program funded by Alberta Works to help youth with disabilities in rural communities to gain work experience and transition from school to adulthood.

### Gaining work experience



When youth with disabilities are able to obtain work experience at an early age, they develop critical skills such as time management and teamwork, which can be transferred into their adult lives. Many youth with disabilities, however, do not gain work experience during high school.

To address this, Vecova received funding from Alberta Works, CIBC and the Rocky View School Board to complete a 1-year pilot of a Youth Transition and Work Experience program in the Rocky View School (RVS) division.

The program is divided into three cohorts of approximately 10 youth who will receive an employability assessment, work preparation, work

experience and work placement supports in three month intervals.

The program started in January 2019 and is currently underway in the communities of Airdrie, Cochrane, Crossfield and Chestermere, assisting 13 students with developing employability and life skills, as well as on-the-job work experience.

Initial conversations are underway with 33 youth and their families to develop transition plans to ensure that the appropriate services and supports, as well as a road map to detail how the youth will achieve their goals into adulthood, are in place.

In the short time that the program has been operational, it has already seen numerous successes. The first youth began attending a work experience within the first month of the program and another youth received paid employment before the end of the first cohort.

Implementing new technology
Vecova has successfully implemented its new Enterprise Resource Management System to manage financial, human resource and scheduling activities. This project required extensive time and effort from various teams across the organization for the past two years. This system supports Vecova's long-term success and financial sustainability, allowing us to modernize the way we work so that we can support the needs of persons with disabilities for years to come.

**Building an inclusive workforce** 

Learning and Development received grant funding for Equipping and Advancing a Culturally Diverse Workforce Project. This project includes Leadership development for non-Canadians, as well as a plain language and curriculum redesign for Vecova's Medication Administration eLearning course.






When I first identified Vecova as a potential organization that the volunteers at my school could be a part of, I emailed the organization right away!

### **Our Past**

Even before the Vocational and Rehabilitation Research Institute (VRRI) became a reality, what started as an idea grew into an innovative concept to provide opportunities for individuals with disabilities in Calgary and across the country.

In 1966, the VRRI published Bringing the Future to Today, in anticipation for the Institute's opening in 1969. According to the publication, it was a "lack of vocational training facilities and sheltered workshops to serve young adults in Calgary" that became a new opportunity to "offer hope for dignity to young adults in the Province of Alberta and all of Canada to create a balanced program of training and services to clients and communities." With a focus on research to guide this innovative system of supports, a program was created with activities and training that would be "directed at maximizing the occupation and social behaviour of young adults" with developmental disabilities.

The VRRI, now the Vecova Centre for Disability Services and Research, opened its doors in 1969 and has grown from a vocational and rehabilitation facility to a respected community service organization dedicated to persons of all abilities.

At Vecova, each individual it serves has a quality of life that is personally meaningful and helps enhance their connection and contribution to the community. Vecova is an internationally recognized research centre for its trendsetting work and deep knowledge of the disability sector, and insight into the key social issues that impact it. Vecova has an acknowledged model of success for its social enterprises, which demonstrate organizational sustainability through an inclusive community.

Vecova will develop creative, affordable and accessible housing and support solutions for Calgarians with disabilities, and contribute to the creation of a healthy housing system for the Calgary region.

Vecova will develop new social enterprises throughout its service and programs as a critical tool to ensure Vecova's continuing sustainability, innovation and financial discipline as it delivers on its mission to improve the quality of life for those with disabilities.

Vecova will continue to meet the lifelong and changing needs of persons with disabilities, the ever-evolving nonprofit and disability sectors, the strategic and business needs of Vecova and find innovative solutions to our most pressing social concerns within our communities with the creation of a new Centre for Social Research and Innovation that focuses on inclusion and equality.
